## Procedures for Obtaining Approval for Concurrent Undergraduate and Graduate Degree Programs

Concurrent undergraduate and graduate degree programs can provide opportunities for well-qualified ISU juniors and seniors to apply for a program leading to both a masters and bachelors degree at the end of a fifth year of study. Students interested in research may apply for a graduate research assistantship during their fourth and fifth years of study. Individualized concurrent degree programs are available.

The following material describes the procedures to obtain approval for a recognized concurrent undergraduate and graduate degree program when both the undergraduate and graduate majors have already been approved. For students pursuing a concurrent undergraduate bachelor's degree and graduate degree, a maximum of 6 graduate credits can be double counted for both the bachelor's degree and the graduate degree subject to the Program of Study committee approval.

The proposal will be reviewed by the Graduate Curriculum and Catalog Committee, by the Graduate Council, by the Graduate College, and by the Dean of the Graduate College.

#### The Proposal for Concurrent Degree Programs

The proposal for concurrent degree programs should include the following information:

#### 1. Name of the program of majors

Event Management (EM)

#### 2. Name of the degrees

Bachelor of Science in Event Management (BS EM)

Masters in Science in Event Management (MS EM)

#### 3. Name of the department(s) which administer(s) the program

Department of Apparel, Events, and Hospitality Management

#### 4. Rationale for the concurrent degree program

The BS EM program started in 2011, and to date, the program has conferred over 550 degrees. Furthermore, the MS EM program started in Fall 2019. We aim to provide another option for undergraduate students seeking graduate education in event management.

#### 5. Admission procedures and requirements

Students currently enrolled in the BS EM program and classified as a senior may be eligible to apply for the Concurrent BS EM/MS EM degree program. For concurrent admission, the student must have an accumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher and be within 18 credits of completing requirements for their BS EM.

#### 6. Requirements of the program

Up to six credits of graduate level coursework taken as an undergraduate during the semester of concurrent enrollment may be double-counted toward the BS M and MS EM.

Additionally, we have developed an AESHM Concurrent Degree From (Appendix) to assist students with the process.

#### 7. Expected enrollment

8-10 students

#### 8. If not already addressed, answer the following:

#### A. How will the undergraduate degree plan and graduate program of study be developed?

Once the student is accepted into the concurrent program, EM DOGE will work with the student to develop the student to develop the program of study until a POS committee is established.

#### B. When will the student have a major professor?

The student will have a major professor the semester the student is classified as a graduate student. After selecting a major professor, the student will have POS meeting with three committee members (including the major professor).

#### C. Will graduate assistantships be provided?

Graduate assistantships will not be provided.

#### D. Will a thesis be required?

A thesis will not be required; however, a creative component will be required.

#### E. Who will be responsible for the administration of the program?

EM Graduate Faculty will be responsible for administration of the program.

## F. How much time is required to complete the program? Show a semester-by-semester plan.

It is expected that students will complete the program within two semesters after graduation with a BS EM degree. Please see below the semester-by-semester plan.

#### G. Will students be allowed to double count credits? If so, how many?

Yes, students will be able to double count 6 credits (highlighted in yellow on semester-bysemester plan).

## Apparel, Events, and Hospitality Management (AESHM) Concurrent Bachelor's of Science + Master's of Science Degree Program Procedures Form

## **Rationale**

The concurrent degree program helps students expedite the completion of a master's degree along with their bachelor's degree. The concurrent degree allows many students to complete a bachelors and masters within 4.5 or 5.5 years, taking graduate and undergraduate courses simultaneously in the 4<sup>th</sup> year and beyond. Six credits of graduate coursework can be used to meet *both* undergraduate and graduate requirements.

In each entering freshman class, approximately 30% of students arrive with at least 10 college credits accumulated. This makes it possible for these capable students to graduate with two degrees in 5 years. Concurrent students are eligible for research and teaching assistantships.

In some instances, the concurrent degree will make students eligible to engage in teaching and research activities during their senior years as graduate assistants. In terms of employment following graduation, having a MS degree may open opportunities to teach in community colleges. According to information from the three AESHM program's executive advisory council members and graduates, a master's degree provides a competitive advantage when seeking industry managerial positions, and hones the research, analytical, and writing skills needed for managerial positions. Students may elect the thesis option to prepare for admission to a Ph.D. program or non-thesis option is preparing for entering industry.

## **Procedures Checklist**

## Pre-Application Period (First-Year to the Junior Years)

- □ Review the requirements for the graduate program sample semester plans.
- □ Contact your undergraduate (UG) advisor early in their program to review these documents and to begin to take the proper courses each semester, which will facilitate BS/MS degree completion in 4.5 or 5.5 years. Note that a 3.0 GPA is needed to be unconditionally admitted to the program.
- □ The UG advisor can work with you in selecting the right UG courses by semester for a *tentative* plan of study.
- □ The UG advisor, student, and Director of Graduate Education (DOGE; Dr. Ann Marie Fiore for AMD, Dr. Tianshu Zheng for HSPM, and Dr. Eric D. Olson for EM) will work together to select the **six credits** that can be used to fulfill UG and graduate degree

requirements simultaneously and additional courses needed to fulfill the master's degree requirements. This is a *tentative* plan of study so that you can affirm interest in the concurrent degree program

### Application Preparation and Submission Period (Junior Year or Upon Completing 60 Credits)

- One year prior to admission into the program, take the GRE or GMAT for AMD and HSP M. This would be in fall semester or very early spring semester before you apply for the concurrent degree program for the following year fall admission.
- □ The application is submitted in the semester before desired admission into the concurrent program (e.g., by February 15 of the junior year or when completing 60 credits for a fall semester admission; October 15 for spring admission)
- □ IMPORTANT: Once you are admitted into the concurrent degree program, you are classified as a graduate student; your eligibility for financial aid and some scholarship may be affected adversely when converting to graduate student status. This varies by funding source. The Graduate College is looking at a way to eliminate this issue.
- ☐ Therefore, before applying to the concurrent degree program, you MUST meet with a financial aid advisor or other funding source representative (e.g., bank if a personal loan) to determine the impact of graduate student status on your college funding sources. Graduate student status usually occurs in your senior year.
- ☐ You should also check the tuition and fees difference between UG and graduate courses, see <u>https://www.registrar.iastate.edu/fees</u>. The AESHM Department offers experiential learning-based majors, which assess slightly higher tuition amounts than other graduate programs.
- At your meeting with financial aid/funding source representative(s) have the representative(s) **sign the Financial Understanding Form** (see below). This form documents that you understand the impact of the change to graduate student status, usually starting in the senior year, has on their educational funding.
- You will apply for the concurrent degree program using the form <u>https://www.grad-college.iastate.edu/documents/forms/Application\_for\_an\_ISU\_Undergraduate\_Student\_Wishing\_to\_Pursue\_a\_Concurrent\_Graduate\_Certificate\_or\_Graduate\_Degree.pdf found on the Graduate College website.

- Along with this form, you must submit the following application materials
  - a. Three letters of recommendation
  - b. Official GRE or GMAT scores (for AMD and HSP M)
  - c. Unofficial undergraduate transcripts from ISU and other institutions
  - d. A Statement of Purpose that describes the student's background, reasons for interest in the graduate program, area of focus (e.g., AMD: creative design, buying, merchandising, sourcing, sustainability, product development and HSPM: lodging operations, hospitality marketing, foodservice management, and food safety and EM), and future goals after graduation

- e. If wanting to focus on design, you should also submit a PDF of your creative/technical design portfolio.
- □ Submit your application for the concurrent degree program and signed Financial Understanding Form to LouAnn Doyle in 31 MacKay Hall in the semester before you apply for the program, usually after 60 credits. Please apply by February 15 for summer or fall semester admission and October 15 for entering in spring semester.
- Once the concurrent degree application is approved by the Graduate College, you are classified as a Graduate Student for the semester of admission noted on the application form. Your financial aid eligibility changes with the semester of admission.
- □ If more than one semester between the original meeting with financial representatives and the application, you MUST again meet with a financial aid officer and amend the Financial Understanding Form to confirm the impact of financial aid for the coming year.
- Once admitted, ask the DOGE (<u>amfiore@iastate.edu or tzheng@iastate.edu</u>) for an assistantship application and complete the CHS scholarship form <u>https://www.hs.iastate.edu/scholarships-and-financial-aid/chs-graduate-student-scholarships/</u>. For best chances please apply by March 1, the priority deadline.
- □ Following confirmation of admission to the concurrent degree program, you should meet with your UG advisor and DOGE to determine courses to take by semester to meet the degree requirements.
- As a requirement of the graduate program, you must establish a Program of Study (POS) committee, which includes a major professor, another AMD, HSPM, and EM faculty member, and one faculty member outside AMD, HSPM, and EM no later than the (October or March) of the second semester classified as a graduate student. The DOGE will assist in this process, including identifying faculty members who are a good fit with your master degree focus.
